Alcoholics Anonymous Great Britain (AAGB) Health Seminar 2021 - A Trustee Perspective

The several times rescheduled Health Seminar took place on 9th October 2021 with a wide representation from all Regions. There were many intergroup and regional Health Liaison Officers (HLO's) amongst the 50+ delegates who attended in person at The Park Inn, York, with many more able to join via the virtual platform.

Many of the original members of the Health Sub Committee who had input into the planning of the Seminar had rotated at the time of the event, however, their ideas were included and these contributed to a most successful, informative and thought-provoking Seminar.

Amanda S, Chair of AAGB Chaired the event and our guest speakers, who gave of their time voluntarily, were indeed well prepared and impressive. Former Non Alcoholic Trustee (NAT) Dr Eric Carlin, now representing the European Region of the World Health Organisation (WHO), spoke about developing their alcohol strategy policy. There was also Mr Dan C MP, Westminster Parliament, Ms Debra Moore, Head of Policy, NHS England and Dr Sarah Flowers, Consultant Psychiatrist and Addiction specialist. Each set the Seminar standard with informative and interesting presentations.

The General Secretary, Ranjan B, presented an overview of the structure of AAGB. This was followed by a very interesting presentation by AA member, Sohan S, on how AA can work within the Black, Asian and Minority Ethnic (BAME) communities.

The afternoon session was opened by current General Service Board (GSB) NAT, Dr Mani Mehdikhani, whose summary of the 2021 quinquennial AAGB survey presented participants with accurate and AA approved statistics to deliver in their talks and presentations to health care professionals.

The Message for the reminder of the Seminar was

CARRYING THE MESSAGE - YES YOU CAN

Robin H, Health Sub Committee, introduced the Health Liaison Officers to the Health Section of the AAGB web pages and to the file store which contains useful presentations, etc. He finished with the role of the Health Sub Committee, and reminded delegates that there are vacancies on the Health Sub Committee. These are advertised on the AAGB website and in AA Service News.

Daniel V, London Region South, gave an excellent description of the Open Meeting Workshops which have been delivered regularly throughout the pandemic to junior doctors, psychiatrists, etc., at St Georges University College Hospital. The workshops have been appreciated as a much-valued contribution to their informed training.

Navraj D, Birmingham Intergroup Community Liaison Officer (CLO), introduced the delegates to this new post created by his intergroup and the amazing work being carried out in such a short time within communities. Hopefully, this will inspire other intergroups to consider introducing such a service post.

Mick A, Glasgow region HLO, concluded with an informative talk based on his own experience of contacting, working with and following through with the addiction nurses at the largest hospital in Scotland.

The feedback from the delegates and from those participating virtually was unanimously positive, valued and appreciated.

AA Health Seminar – A Participants Perspective

As Health Liaison Officer for Milton Keynes Intergroup, I was fortunate enough to attend the Health Seminar at The Park Inn hotel in York on Saturday the 9th of October 2021, along with around 50 other Intergroup and Regional Liaison Officers and members of the Fellowship. There were also many people attending online, both AA members and health professionals, and other interested parties.

As someone new to this level of service and with less than three years sobriety at the time, this was a wonderful, eye-opening experience which has enhanced my understanding of how the fellowship works, what is possible, and the things that members have managed to do in interacting with health professionals. It will help me to be of better service.

Arriving on the Friday evening, I was excited but a little nervous, not helped by the M1 being closed and never having been to York before, but was met with a very friendly reception at the front desk of the hotel. The member of hotel staff there told me how much he liked, “your group,” and was full of warmth towards us. He told me that everyone was having dinner in the restaurant and so I made my way there. I need not have been nervous; it was just like arriving at a meeting and feeling at home with people very quickly. I went to bed that evening feeling very happy and grateful to be there.

In the morning, the seminar started in the Henley Suite, a big hall in the centre of the hotel with a large projector screen for presentations and for those attending online, and round tables for us all to sit around. The speakers were excellent and I found the whole event very inspiring and motivating.

Dr. Eric Carlin from the World Health Organisation, Europe had a great deal of statistics and information about the effects of alcohol and how it affects public health. For instance, he said that there are three million deaths worldwide each year due to alcohol and one million of those are in the European region. In Europe, 14.8 % of men have an alcohol use disorder and 3.5% of women. 1 in 10 deaths are due to alcohol and 1 in 4 of those aged

20 – 24. He also talked about the Cochrane Review that says there is high certainty evidence that 12 step fellowships work. He said that it is important to stress that there is evidence of effectiveness when approaching medical professionals.

Dan C, MP talked about his own experience of AA and recovery and how he is promoting addiction as an illness in Parliament. He talked about the cost to the UK economy that alcohol harm has and that there has been no government strategy since 2012. He also said that he believes in visible recovery, the value of recovery to society, and that a recovering alcoholic is an asset to every community.

Debbie Moore, from NHS England spoke about developing the NHS comprehensive model for personalised care, an all age, whole population approach. She talked about social prescribing and said that one in five GP appointments is about wider social needs, rather than medical issues. She also mentioned that 41% – 63 % of people struggle with health information literacy.

Sohan S, Director of BAC-IN (Recovery Charity), spoke about his experience in AA and the low uptake in black Asian and minority ethnic (BAME) communities. He talked about access and engagement issues for people from BAME communities, in terms of drug and alcohol support. Including the impact of stigma, past experience of racism and discrimination and mistrust of services. He spoke about the work of BAC-IN in helping people from these communities.

Dr Sarah Flowers, an addiction specialist doctor working in an NHS twelve step rehab centre, gave a doctor's view of AA. She said that she has 25 years experience as a doctor, yet it was years before she encountered people in recovery. She had one hour on alcohol in six years training. In 2003 she went to a meeting and has been a great supporter of AA ever since. She started prescribing recovery, working and linking with AA, and talked about Open Meeting Workshops as a way to engage with clinicians. Dr Flowers also had a great deal of advice for approaching clinicians, for example, explaining that doctors don't often encounter people in recovery so may be cynical, that there is no conflict between AA and doctors or clinicians, and that AA is a lifetime of free aftercare.

For the benefit of any health professionals or other people outside of the fellowship attending the seminar, Ranjan B, the General Manager of Alcoholics Anonymous Great Britain (AAGB), talked briefly about the structure of AA, what it is and isn't and how it works.

After lunch, NAT, Dr Mani Mehdikhani, a clinical psychologist, talked about how his view of AA changed, and also the 2020 AA Membership Survey. He said that he had three days on addiction in three years' training. He talked about being hostile towards AA but how attending a meeting changed that. He gave us some points from the AA survey: that in 2020, recorded membership was 53% male, 43% female, and 0.5% other. This compares to 1972 when it was 78% male and 22% female. Average age has increased, membership is 92% white, and in 2020 55% of members had over 10 years sobriety.

There was then a group of AA speakers who talked under the heading of Carrying the message – Yes you can!

Robin H talked about the file store and other resources available on the AAGB website. He then talked about how to run Open Meeting Workshops and how they have been found to work best at medical training facilities. He also said to state the objective at the beginning, for example, "We hope that you will be prepared to recommend AA by the end of the meeting!"

When carrying the message to professionals, Mick A spoke about how important it is to identify who to talk to, to present well, and think about the environment you are entering.

Navraj D talked about the AA service position of Community Liaison Officer created in Birmingham, specifically for BAME membership. He also spoke about the success of creating a dual language meeting in Handsworth. How having banners and literature in dual languages has made people feel at home, creating Punjabi twelfth-steppers and how the Literature Sub Committee has helped.

Danielle V talked about holding Open Meeting Workshops at St George's University College Hospital. She described the structure of an Open Meeting Workshop with year 4 medical students – how it is done – and said that the feedback was extremely positive.

Obviously, this only represents a fraction of what was presented. I found the seminar to be an uplifting experience and it was so valuable and confidence building to be able to hear all the experience of the speakers. I was quite blown away by what the people I heard have accomplished in service, yet with humility and a simple desire to carry the message. I am very grateful to everyone who organised and ran the seminar and who were so welcoming and happy to offer advice. It was a gift and a privilege to be there and to be able to report back to my intergroup, where, working together, I hope we can achieve some good things. We sometimes talk about staying in the middle of the bed. On my drive home, it felt that the bed was a lot bigger than I realised!

Service ... humility and responsibility

‘All AA progress can be reckoned in terms of just two words: humility and responsibility. Our whole spiritual development can be accurately measured by our degree of adherence to these magnificent standards.’

Humility and responsibility were not exactly the words that anyone would have used to describe me before I came to AA. The total opposite was true - I was prideful and irresponsible.

My service journey began when I first ask a lady to sponsor me and I joined my home group. It was suggested that I arrive early to help set up the meeting. I remember hearing the phrase ‘there is sober time under every chair’, which has stuck with me to this day. Not long after, I was given my first taste of responsibility – I was asked to be the ‘ashtray’ person for my group. A very important position it was back then, when it was rare that a newcomer didn't need a ciggy during the meeting. My job was to lay the

ashtrays out on every other chair, clear them afterwards as well as keeping the external area butt free. It was pride, used in the right way, that kept me showing up for that service. I didn't want to risk letting my home group down as I had started to feel really welcome and comfortable there. After years of being kicked out of places, this was refreshing.

Slowly, as the old timers in my group could sense that I was starting to demonstrate responsibility, I was guided through the service structure of my home group and then onto the general service structure of AA. Last year I completed my final year as a Conference Delegate. What an honour and privilege this has been.

At every step of the way, my Sponsor encouraged me to read the relevant guidelines and service literature. This meant that I felt prepared for each position, for example when I became an intergroup officer, I was already familiar with the AA Service and Structure Manuals. Often there was no one to sponsor me into positions, so I had to take responsibility to read the guidelines and seek out the experience of old timers. This all meant that I was able to contribute to an informed conscience, rather than making things up as I went along.

A big part of being responsible has simply been to turn up to committee meetings, on time and prepared. Also, to do what I have said I am going to do. (Hence, I am writing this article for our group Share/AASN rep actually!)

I have made lots of mistakes during my time in service. My sponsor has always tried to encourage me to 'pick my battles'. This has meant trying to remain silent on some matters, even if I do have a strong opinion, in order to be more effective when voicing my viewpoint on matters of even greater importance. I have also been taught that I do not need to open my mouth and say things, just for the sake of saying something in a committee meeting. Anyone who has done service with me is probably laughing at this point, as I find these things almost impossible to do.

There will always be the occasional situations where we have a responsibility to 'take a stand against the storm' to quote Bill, even if we are a lone voice. This is scary and somehow seems to take more humility than keeping quiet about things, because it risks not being liked. This is where good Sponsorship

comes in though. Both my Sponsor and his Sponsor have always been at the end of the phone to reassure me that I am still loved, despite how I feel!

I am always mindful that the wonderful life I have today is a result of me being sponsorable, working the steps and continuing to be an active member of an active group. I still arrive at my home group early to help set up (although there are no ashtrays to put out nowadays).

AA members can be of service to the Fellowship in so many different ways and they are all important. Everyone can play their part. As Bill W says 'An AA service is anything whatever that helps us to reach a fellow sufferer – ranging all the way from the Twelfth Step itself to a ten-cent call and a cup of coffee, and to AA's General Service office for national and international action'.

Archives Sub Committee Vacancy

There is a vacancy on the Archives Sub Committee of the General Service Board (GSB)

The Archives Sub Committee advises the GSB on issues concerning the care and management of Alcoholics Anonymous Great Britain (AAGB) Archives, reporting to the Board through the Trustee responsible for Archives. The main AA Archive is now located at the Borthwick Institute for Archives of the University of York, and the Archives Sub Committee works with archivists at the Borthwick Institute to develop and enhance this archive, while managing access to it for the purpose of research.

Other AA archives are held by regions and intergroups which are looked after by local archivists, and the Archives Sub Committee liaises with the Archive Network of regional and intergroup archivists.

Applicants for the Sub Committee should have a minimum of five years' sobriety, will normally serve for a period of four years and should be familiar with the Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions, the AA Service and Structure Handbooks for Great Britain, and other Conference approved Alcoholics Anonymous literature. Some experience of archival work is desirable – especially experience as an Intergroup or Regional Archivist within AA. Some knowledge of AA history is also advantageous, as are good communication and IT skills.

The successful candidates would normally be expected to attend four meetings a year; two of these will normally be in York, but the other two may be held online.

The Chair, Vice Chair, Secretary or a currently serving Liaison Officer of the sponsoring region or intergroup must endorse the application by way of a covering letter. Current application forms are available from GSO or the AAGB website in the Document Library. The closing date for applications is Friday, 8th April 2022.

Applicants who are serving members of the Armed Forces, or ex-Service men and women would be advantageous but is not essential. The aim of the Sub Committee is to raise awareness of Alcoholics Anonymous within the Armed Services community, both serving and ex-serving personnel, including their families.

Main aims are:

- Offer support and advice to regional Armed Services Liaison Officers.
- Help promote and encourage the appointment of Liaison Officers.

It is suggested that applicants would fulfil the following criteria:

- A personal service history at either intergroup and/or region in this discipline
- Good organisational and communication skills are desirable. The ability to produce written and verbal reports would be an advantage, as well as relevant IT skills.

Armed Services Sub Committee members will normally serve for a period of four years. There is an expectation that Armed Services Sub Committee members normally attend two meetings a year in York and participate in possible "conference call" meeting(s) as and when required, giving notice to the GSB Trustee if unable to attend/participate.

The Chair, Vice Chair, Secretary or a currently serving Liaison Officer of the sponsoring region or intergroup must endorse the application by way of a covering letter.

The Electronic Communications Sub Committee (ECSC) invites members of our Fellowship to join us in the exciting work of using electronic communications to help those who need help, and to keep existing members informed.

Various roles exist within the Sub Committee:

- Microsite Admin assists Region and Intergroup ECLOs with the set up and maintenance of their local websites within the AAGB site structure.
- Filestore Admin monitors the use of this secure storage area, ensuring access requests are properly validated.
- The Workplace platform is being trialled by the Board, Sub Committees, and by a couple of regions. WP Admin supervises the allocation of secure access and assists new users.
- Helpdesk deals primarily with a variety of service-related queries, requests for email addresses etc.

An interest in electronic communications and a desire to do meaningful service in a fascinating area is more important than anything else in these roles. Our various IT suppliers provide technical support. Although good basic computer literacy is required, more important to us is an understanding of how people communicate and the desire to help us improve what we do.

As with all Sub Committee vacancies, five years' continuous sobriety and the endorsement of your region or intergroup are required. You should be flexible in time commitments, and be prepared to join us occasionally online as well as attending several meetings per year in York, where accommodation is provided and expenses paid.

The Employment Sub Committee is a Sub Committee of The General Service Board (GSB) of Alcoholics Anonymous.

We have vacancies for new Sub Committee members

Our Primary Functions are to:

1. Create a consistent message externally that differentiates AA from other bodies.
2. Establish and maintain good relations with professionals and professional bodies at national level.
3. Establish and maintain good relations with employers and companies at national level.
4. Increase public and professional knowledge of the AA programme.
5. Offer support to Regional and Intergroup Liaison Officers.
6. Create and maintain an accurate system of record keeping for future officers and events.
7. Communicate effectively with the Fellowship.
8. Comply with the principles and guidelines of AA.

The Sub Committee meets up to four times a year in York, although some of the meetings may take the form of telephone conferencing. Much of the work is done in the interim generally in partnership with the other members of the committee.

Vacancy for Fellowship Archivist

Vacancy for Fellowship Archivist

For many years AA's central Fellowship Archive at GSO was managed by the Fellowship Archivist. Following the transfer of this Archive to the Borthwick Institute at the University of York, some of that work has been transferred to archivists at the Borthwick Institute. An important role for a Fellowship Archivist remains, however, to collaborate with other archivists in developing AA's archives, both the largest one at the Borthwick Institute and the numerous regional and intergroup archives.

Following the resignation of the previous Fellowship Archivist, there is an opportunity for a new appointment to bring together the work of local AA archivists and archivists at the Borthwick Archive, while promoting the value and importance of AA's archives as a resource for historical research among the Fellowship and to those who support the work of AA.

The responsibilities of the position will include: -

- Working closely with the Archives Network to encourage and support local archivists

- Liaising with archivists at the Borthwick Institute for Archives on questions concerning the AA Archive at the Borthwick, such as access to papers in the archive
- Advising the Archives Sub Committee on general policy issues and priorities such as the transfer of materials from local AA archives to the Borthwick Institute
- Advising the General Secretary and GSO staff on issues concerning the administration of AA archives
- Helping with the organisation of exhibitions at the Borthwick Institute, GSO, NSO, SSO, and at regional AA events
- Working with the AA Web manager on developing the archives section of the AA website

Applications are now invited for this position of Fellowship Archivist.
