Q&A WITH MOIRA

What is your role and how long have you been in it?

I am member of the Liaison Committee created last year to help keep unfilled service positions active. Since then, I have been involved with public information, probation and Share Magazine; as well as assisting with prisons and health.

What is the highlight of doing this roles?

Attending the seminar at General Service Office covering prisons, probation and Criminal Justice Services has been extremely interesting. So far I've learned a lot and I met great members of the fellowship who are also involved in service.

What impact do you feel this role has had on your recovery?

Service has impacted immensely on my recovery. Since my first month in sobriety, which was July 1994, I have been in service one way or another. First at my home group, then at Intergroup and also at SE Region. Recovery, Unity and Service appear on our logo. Service strengthens my recovery and helps me to support the unity of our wonderful fellowship.

I'm always happy to share my service experiences with anyone who maybe interested in supporting the local fellowship.

The AA at QA Hospital in Portsmouth is running smoothly with a bank of volunteers running the sessions booked up until October. As a two-week commitment for service, its an ideal role for those who struggle to find time regularly or need something more casual. I'd also like to thank those who have stepped up to be reserves - I have many in waiting when people can't make it last minute! I've spoken twice to the trainee nurses who work on the Fishbourne ward at St Richards in Chichester. There was a meeting held in Albany on July 25th with nine inmates taking part in the meeting and six Big Books, six steps and traditions; and six living sober books were taken in with the approval of our contact. Armed Forces Liaison Officer's Report

Work continues to support still suffering alcoholics who have served or who still serve in His Majesty's Armed Forces. A regular commitment to the Veterans Outreach Services open afternoon at the Royal Maritime Club in Portsmouth has proven valuable in passing the message and the AFLO attended Health Fayres at both HMS Excellent and HMS Sultan.

It has become clear that the work of the liaison committee in this area is essential. However, with limited committee members and much to do the AFLO is appealing to the fellowship for volunteers.

Specifically, we would like to create a team of veteran or serving fellows with a minimum of 1 years sobriety to support the AFLO directly. Further, those who have not yet reached a year of sobriety are invited to support that team.

Intergroup Archivist - Job Description

These are ideal guidelines and should be considered in the context of an informed group conscience. Enthusiasm in Archives work is a pre-requisite, historical AA knowledge is not. Nobody can be expected to have the understanding and skills for the job, right from the start. This is one reason why Archives is non-rotational, as it is a continuous learning exercise. Storage of materials should not be problematical; ways can be found of safely storing all materials if the issue is raised by the Intergroup Archivist, named in the AA Confidential Directory.

Initial requirements:

- · Ideally, have completed one or more posts at Intergroup
- · Be prepared to make a long-term commitment to the post.
- · Be prepared to learn archives skills and local AA history.
- · Collect Intergroup minutes and other reports of Intergroup activity.
- · Have working knowledge of AA Service Structure and Traditions
 - · Become a named person in the Confidential Directory.
 - \cdot $\,$ Use the Intergroup Archivist AA e-mail supplied by GSO.

After settled into the job:

- · Encourage enthusiasts to document history of their group.
- \cdot Liaise and co-operate with Regional Archivist on regular basis.
- · Regularly report to I/G on work done or planned. (or just tell them who you are and what you are trying to do).
 - · Have working knowledge of the GB Archives Policy and Procedure document.
- · Have working knowledge of the guide for Alcoholics Anonymous Great Britain Intergroup and Regional archivist
 - · Encourage others to keep memorabilia and paperwork.
 - · Set up an inventory of who is keeping what.

When confidence begins to grow through acquired knowledge and understanding:

- · Turn information collected into another form, e.g. write 1 page history of prison service work from Intergroup prison reports.
 - · Gather from archives enthusiasts, a group of 'like-minded' people, to work on bigger projects e.g. history of Intergroup.
 - · Consider various forms of archival displays, and where could be used.

NATALIE SHARES HER THOUGHTS ON AA BEING "ALL INCLUSIVE"

Hi, I'm Natalie. I've been in the rooms for four years and I've just collected my four year chip. When I first came into the rooms I was identifying as a non-binary person - not a man, not a woman, just a person.

I've always felt accepted by AA and always been welcomed exactly as I am but there was one piece of wording which stood out to me at the start of every meeting - "AA is a fellowship of men and women". I assumed this line wasn't written to exclude me but it didn't feel like it fully included me.

After a couple of years in the rooms I heard that there was an update coming "AA is a fellowship of people" and I was overjoyed. Groups were encouraged to discuss the update at conscience meetings to decide whether to use the new official wording or to use the old wording. I set out to communicate to those around me how much difference it made to some people. The groups I attend regularly made the change and use the new wording.

I'm no longer identifying as non-binary, now I'm just a plain old woman so does the new wording still feel right to me? Absolutely, as a woman I'm also a person.

Being around AA for the past four years I've learned more about the origins, I know that it started off targeting men and that later women started joining. I can see how the choice of words "fellowship of men and women" must have been intended to include everyone. As time has moved on the original words no longer sound as inclusive as they were intended to sound and I'm really pleased that it's been updated.

Travelling around different groups I mostly hear the "fellowship of people" version but occasionally I'm met with the older one. If you're in a group that still uses the older one I want to ask whether you'd consider moving over to the new wording. I know that at the time that the changeover was happening you will have had this conversation, maybe you had specific reasons at the time for keeping the wording the same or maybe you just didn't have a compelling enough reason to change.

I brought a nonbinary friend to AA and after the meeting one of the first things they commented on was the "men and women" comment - honestly, I'd rather be having the "why do they keep mentioning God?" conversation instead.
